BUBONIC PLAGUE IN CALIFORNIA.

The information given out by the Maine Hospital Service that since Feb. 22 here have been thirty-one deaths from oubonic plague in San Francisco and hree others in California outside the ity is sufficiently startling to impose pon the Governor of that State a duty of a very exigent character. For some ime there has been a conflict of opinion, and possibly of authority, between the California State Board of Health and he Board of Health of San Francisco. The State Board insists that there is no pubonic plague on the Pacific Coast. The local board insists that it not only exists but is steadily increasing. Surreon General WYMAN of the Marine Hosital Service appears to agree with Presiient HUTCHINSON of the local board.
